Get boosted! Keeping safe amidst the surge in COVID-19 cases

The public health guidance has been evolving. As well, COVID-19 testing protocols have changed to reflect the high number of active cases and is now dependent on severity of symptoms, vaccination status and other risk factors. Please check the latest guidelines for testing at the <u>BCCDC website</u>.

We would like to take this time to remind everyone about continuing to follow our site safety protocols. This includes wearing a medical mask at all times while on-site when not alone in an office and maintaining physical distancing as much as possible. Our COVID-19 safety plan is <u>available HERE</u>.

The symptoms for the omicron variant are different. As such, if you have ANY allergy or coldlike symptoms, please isolate at home <u>until you have met these three requirements</u>: minimum five days from symptom onset or positive test results if you are fully vaccinated (10 days if you are not), fever-free for 24 hours and improved symptoms, as per BCCDC's current guidance.

We would also like to urge anyone who has not received a COVID-19 vaccine booster shot yet to please prioritize this. All BCCHR admin staff and UBC personnel who work on-site at the Oak Street campus are included in the <u>health-care worker vaccination stream</u>.

Who are you?



My name is Robert Selles. I am a Registered Psychologist who has specialized in the assessment and psychosocial treatment of obsessivecompulsive, anxiety, and tic-related disorders with a particular focus on their presentation among youth and within families. I received my PhD

Robert Selles from the University of South Florida and completed clinical residency at Brown University prior to coming to complete a post-doctoral fellowship with the Provincial OCD Program at the University of British Columbia and BC Children's Hospital.

What are you working on?

Over the past 5.5 years, I have been working primarily on projects that seek to improve our understanding of how OCD presents in youth and families and how we can improve our methods of delivery treatment in order to optimize outcomes. For example, I have explored how youth's insight regarding their symptoms relates to their responsiveness to intervention, examined ways in which families respond to and manage OCD, and studied the potential benefits of providing treatment in an intensive format within individual's homes. I have also been contributing to the Personal Impacts of COVID-19 Survey (PICS) project, which explores mental health impacts and needs resulting from the pandemic.

Who are you working with?

I have worked primarily with Dr. S. Evelyn Stewart as well as the other clinical and research staff within the Provincial OCD Program at BC Children's Hospital.

I have also collaborated with other faculty in outpatient mental health at BC Children's. Working with a subspecialty population, I also have a network of collaborators from other OCD programs across Canada and in Australia, Scandanavia, India, and the US.

Why this project?

As I will be completing my post-doctoral fellowship in February and moving out of active research, the large majority of my projects are now completed with final touches being placed on a few outstanding manuscripts. However, I also remain engaged with the PICS project which is now moving towards publication of initial results and the implementation of a second qualitative follow-up phase.

Now Launched! The Provincial Mental Health and Substance Use Network

We are excited to share that we have launched the Provincial Mental Health and Substance Use Network ('the Network')! An evidence-informed mechanism to address system-level challenges, the Network will focus on issues relating to British Columbians with complex needs, including mental health and/or substance use, acquired brain injury, developmental disability, complex/ challenging behaviours and/or violence, and criminal justice involvement.

We are delighted to introduce you to Krista and Ashley, who sit within Deborah Ross' Strategic Initiatives team.



Krista English, PhD, the Senior Network Lead, brings a strong background in network science, specifically related to transmission dynamics of contagions, initially applied to infectious diseases and then later to the spread of knowledge. She is excited to apply this expertise in support of addressing the unmet needs of individuals with complex mental health and substance use (MHSU) issues.



Ashley Radomski, PhD, the Network Lead, has worked closely with local, provincial and national teams to provide evidence for improving mental health care practices across the lifespan, through treatment options and policy recommendations. She is dedicated to ensuring the needs of individuals accessing MHSU services drive how we understand and improve care delivery.

Why a Network?

The goal of The Network is to address the unmet needs of individuals with complex MHSU issues who also have needs relating to criminal justice system involvement, acquired brain injuries, developmental disabilities, and/or complex challenging behaviours.

The Network brings together people with lived and living experience alongside representative and committed stakeholders from the health authorities and related sectors in a dynamic structure designed to facilitate and accelerate the knowledge translation and exchange (KTE) process. As an incubator for new ideas, the Network helps advance innovative thinking on complex issues. The Network also connects existing or planned projects across the province to create synergy, drive scalability, and improve sustainability of impact.

The Network as a Mechanism for KTE

KTE is an iterative process that encompasses a spectrum of activities involved in making knowledge useful for the intended audience, including synthesis, dissemination, exchange and application. The Network optimizes KTE by connecting unique combinations of stakeholders within health settings and across various sectors to develop solutions to complex problems. According to Krista, "Iterative and integrated KTE is everything that we do... it's so critical to innovation. Solutions for such complex issues span providers, programs, and services, even beyond the healthcare system, which is why many of these gaps remain.
