News & Announcements

COVID-19 global emergency declared over

On Friday, May 5, the World Health Organization declared the end of COVID-19 as a global health emergency and many of the remaining COVID-19 Provincial Health Orders have been rescinded as part of the end of the 2022/23 respiratory season announcement, effective Thursday, April 6.

For those working in the health system, <u>vaccination requirements for health-care system workers remain in place</u>. We recognize that COVID-19 is still with us, and will be with us for the foreseeable future, so we need to continue to monitor and to take measures we know to protect ourselves and others, stay vigilant on hand hygiene and stay home when ill. Masks will continue to be made available at entrances for those who choose to wear them.

What has changed?

- Universal masking at healthcare settings is no longer required; however, medical masks
 continue to be available at entrances and we will support those who choose to wear them.
- Visitor restrictions are no longer in effect.
- Entrance screening for respiratory symptoms, vaccination status of visitors and enforcing universal masking are no longer in effect.
- Rapid Access Testing at long-term care and assisted living settings will not be required.
- There will be changes related to COVID-19-specific return to work guidance, outbreak guidance, viral respiratory illness surveillance, among others. This will take time to implement throughout all health authorities.

We appreciate that some have varying comfort levels. As such, respecting and supporting individual choices around masking and personal space will be important.

Who are you?

I am Dr. S. Evelyn Stewart, a child and adolescent psychiatrist, and a clinical and neuroscience researcher. I am a Professor in the Department of Psychiatry at the University of British Columbia (UBC) and the founding director of the BC Children's Hospital (BCCH) Provincial Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder Clinic and Research Program. I am also a principal investigator of the BCMHSUS RI, and the Research Director for BCCH Child,

Youth and Reproductive Mental Health program, and a member of the BC Mental Health & Substance Use Services Research Institute. I lead the Brain, Behaviour & Development Theme at the BCCH Research Institute.

What are you working on?

I am currently working on several projects. These include a mix-methods study on COVID impacts on youth and young adult mental health, and OCD clinical trials for celeoxib (Anti-inflammatory), and group family-based CBT. We have undertaken biomarker studies examining epigenetics and peripheral inflammatory markers pre and post treatment. We are also continuing longstanding examinations of stress and family factors in OCD, including the potential role of childhood trauma. Finally, collaborative work with other BCMHSUS researchers includes studies of biased against disconfirmatory evidence in OCD vs Eating Disorders and of a naturalistic viewing paradigm in OCD.

Who are you working with?

As noted above I have several collaborations within PHSA and BCMHSUS. These include projects with Jehannine Austin, Tamara Vanderwal, Todd Woodward, Jennifer Coelho, Clare Beasley, and Roberto Sassi among others.

Why this project?

I am working on the above projects to advance knowledge of treatment interventions and long-term course, in addition to their potential predictors in children, youth, and young adults.

Fun fact

I am looking forward to returning to in person work at BCMHSUS now that the pandemic has resolved. However, I will be leaving home two puppies, Cedar and Waldo who joined our family during the shutdown!

Advancing Virtual Primary Care for People with Opioid Use Disorder

Having recently launched their recruitment phase, this study explores how the rapid introduction of virtual health care during COVID-19 has affected primary care access and patient outcomes for people with opioid use disorder

Interested individuals would participate in interviews to explore accessibility, impact on quality of care and experiences with accessing opiate agonist therapies and treatment for co-occurring conditions. Participants may be compensated for their time.

Knowledge Exchange on Reader Boards (KERB) is a new project that shares research done by and at BCMHSUS through easy-to-understand infographics. It takes key messages from research and breaks them down, making them easy to understand.

KERB is a collaboration between various partners to raise awareness and interest about research involving BCMHSUS researchers, clinicians, clients, and leaders. It does this through activities like putting infographics like the ones below on large TV monitors called Reader Boards at sites like the Red Fish Healing Centre. Our current team includes three patient partners, a director of inter-professional practice, an advisor of patient experience and community engagement, and a knowledge exchange lead. So far we have produced two infographics from work involving Dr. Christian Schütz.
